From the Minister

The older part of the delightful house currently in use as Albury Vicarage was built when doorways were whatever height the builder decided. Quite often, I guess, they built them at a comfortable height for themselves. And it appears that the builder of this house was a bit shorter than me. Quite a bit.

I thought that average human heights in the UK had been steadily increasing since the year dot, but in fact they have gone up and down according to diet, climate, living conditions, disease, work, and more. In the 12th century people were nearly as tall as they are now, then they shrank for a couple of hundred years, before growing again. They shrank a lot after the mid 17th century: from roughly 1700 to 1800, average heights were five to six inches shorter than today. But we are now on another upward trend. And I bang my head on old doorways.

This has caused me to make interesting discoveries, chief among which is that I am incapable of holding a conversation and remembering to duck at the same time.

I know that I am taller than average; even today most people don't have a problem in our house. But I have been used to living in a world where people above average height could fit through doorways, and like the dinosaurs, I have failed to adapt. I am out of kilter with the house I live in.

So whose fault it is that I bang my head? I could say 'It's the house's fault! The world should fit me!' Or I can accept that if I live in a house with low doorways, I need to adapt to the house.

Clearly with the house I must adapt. But does that always apply when the world does not fit us? When it is not a building, but culture, that we're talking about, the answer isn't nearly so obvious. When should we push against the flow? Christians are one group who have never been strangers to living out of kilter with the world, long before individualism was a thing. 'Do not be conformed to the world,' wrote the apostle Paul. Contrary to today's perceptions, this often meant standing for liberty and equality in a world of oppression.

But sometimes we need to respect society's norms. Constantly upsetting each other by being awkward is not very helpful. Perhaps we need principles so that conformity does not lead into unthinking acceptance of injustice, and so that taking a stand of our own is not pure self-indulgence.

Long ago Jesus, a man who was killed for not conforming, although he preached a kingdom of community and love, repeated two principles ancient even when he spoke. We could do worse: 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind'. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.'"

Your garden in August

The Anglo-Saxon for August is *Weod monath* or the "weed month." Perhaps this is because the weeds grow really quickly this month or because some of us go on holiday neglecting our garden and the weeds take full advantage of the lack of hoeing and attention.

It is time to do that favourite task of gardeners—pruning the wisteria. Unlike most roses and other shrubs, wisteria grows as tall as a house. With a lack of pruning, it can lurk in the gutters, gain entrance through open windows and generally make a nuisance of itself. Each whippy shoot needs to be trimmed back to five or six leaves. Get everything ready before you start. Check your ladder has not gone walkabout and if wooden, has not succumbed to wood worm or death watch beetle, sharpen your secateurs, get out your hard hat and climbing ropes. Spread a large tarpaulin to catch the clippings. Consider putting an old mattress or three underneath should you lean a little far from the ladder. Think about contacting 'Wisterias are Us' to do the job instead and retreat to the potting shed for a little restorative brandy.

Your vegetable plot will have gone into full production. You delight in the first few French beans you harvest, three days later you wonder what you will do with them all as your super-sized trug overflows. Courgettes will become marrows in the twinkling of an eye, your chard will produce epic quantities, your lettuce will run to seed faster than you can harvest it and if it rains, your potatoes and tomatoes may catch blight.

Make sowings of beetroot, radishes, kale, spinach, lettuce and salad crops, all fast growing courtesy of slugs, snails and pigeons. They can go into your veggie plot after you harvest your onions and potatoes.

Deadhead your flowers frequently to ensure repeat flowering. Water and feed ,your containers often, cut back flowering herbaceous plants which can look a bit tired (rather like the gardener) to get a fresh flush of leaves and possibly some more flowers. Remove the flower and seed heads of plants you do not wish to take over your garden, for example, Alchemilla, hardy geraniums, Welsh poppies, hellebores, Acanthus and golden rod. Think about digging out those plants you planted in error, have moved in from next door or are just the wrong plant in the wrong place. You are unlikely to succeed as every little scrap of root will have the space to take over from the parent. On the other hand, if you have a spot in the garden where nothing appears to grow, some of these thugs may prove useful. Or they may just break out of that space and attempt garden domination.

St Swithun's day proved wet so the weather may be unsettled until the end of the month, or the really hot weather may migrate from Southern Europe and give us temperatures in the 40s Centigrade. Either way, make sure your potting shed is stocked with the appropriate equipment. Sou'wester, fan, sunblock, umbrellas for rain and shine, kettle, fridge and a good range of beverages. Sit back in a comfortable chair looking out over your domain with your feet up, inside if raining and outside if dry. If the weather turns out to be unseasonably hot, keep well hydrated and don't behave like a mad dog or Englishman.

News from Shere Surgery

Staffing: I am delighted to be able to announce that our new Practice Manager has started with us. We like to think that Lorraine (Knapp) is returning home, as she worked at Shere many years ago as our fundholding manager. She has since been working as a Practice Manager at a busy surgery in Woking. Lorraine lives locally and has hit the ground running back at Shere. We are very excited to have her with us!

Flu Vaccines: Many of you will remember that last year our flu vaccine delivery was late. This meant that many of you were worried and chose a pharmacy instead. Unfortunately, this led to a lot of wasted vaccines, and cost associated. We wanted to reassure you that this year we put in our order over a year in advance (it is always tricky to get it right as decisions on entitlement/type of vaccine etc are sometimes sprung on us at short notice). We have been assured delivery at the start of September, and we will advertise availability as soon as the delivery date is confirmed. If possible, we would like to encourage you to get your vaccination from us so that we don't have to throw any away. However, the priority is getting patients vaccinated, so please choose whichever method is most convenient. (NB We are still failing to meet our childhood immunisation targets, so any suggestions on challenging anti-vaccination beliefs would be welcomed)

Medication Shortages: An ongoing problem involving a wide range of medications, from nasal sprays for hayfever, to the ongoing HRT supply problem, and more recently diabetes drugs. We continue to evolve our plans for these patients, finding suitable alternatives, and explaining them. This is hugely time consuming, and we continue to push for top-down changes that would help to ease the burden for all practices.

Rural Inequity in the NHS Recovery Plan: I am delighted to report that Jeremy Hunt has accepted my invitation to meet with the CEO of the Dispensing Doctors Association and myself to look at the rural inequity built into the recovery plan, which will provide you with poorer access to healthcare than your urban counterparts. I haven't heard back from our local MP on the subject. If anyone else who wrote received a reply, I wonder if you could let me know?

SALV Evening Meeting: We are currently preparing for the autumn meeting and are



hoping to be talking about how to keep your heart healthy. We really would welcome a younger audience to this, and we are hoping to have a demonstration device of a new defibrillator for home use, which is relatively inexpensive. Whilst we hope these devices will never be needed, there are some patients that may find them extremely reassuring. My son Felix will also be presenting (for 3

minutes only!) his project on engaging with Brenda that was presented at the rural medicine conference last month.

Have a lovely summer and keep well as we head toward autumn.

We recently had a get-together with some of our cinema volunteers to say thank you for all that they do for us. The photo shows some of the committee, projectionists and other volunteers.

In August we will be showing - the following films:

Thursday 3 August - Allelujah - is a warm and deeply moving story about old age. The film has been adapted by Heidi Thomas (creator of Call the Midwife) from the 2018 play by Alan Bennett. It stars 'a formidable selection of seasoned British acting talent', including Judi Dench, Jennifer Saunders and Derek Jacobi. When the geriatric ward in a small Yorkshire hospital is threatened with closure, the hospital decides to fight back by galvanizing the local community: they invite a news crew to film their preparations for a concert in honour of the hospital's most distinguished nurse. What could go wrong? *Allelujah* celebrates the spirit of the elderly patients whilst paying tribute to the deep humanity of the medical staff battling with limited resources and ever-growing demand. This film has received mixed reviews, but 'if you think of the film as a love-letter to the NHS, and ignore the melodramatic late twist, you'll enjoy it'. Classification: 12 A (Running time is 1 hour 39 minutes). Start time: 7.30pm

Sunday 13th August - Everything Everywhere All at Once - was a sensation at the 2023 Oscars, winning 9 Oscars including: Best picture, best director, best actress, best supporting actress, best supporting actor! When an inter-dimensional rupture unravels reality, an unlikely hero (a middle-aged Chinese immigrant played by Michelle Yeoh), must channel her newfound powers to fight bizarre and bewildering dangers from the multiverse as the fate of the world hangs in the balance. She alone can save 'existence' by exploring other universes and connecting with the lives she could have led. "While the hectic action sequences and flights of science-fiction mumbo-jumbo are a big part of the fun, they aren't really the point. The central message is about the importance of kindness and essentially, it's a bittersweet domestic drama, a marital comedy, a story of immigrant-striving, and a hurt-filled ballad of mother-daughter love". Classification: 15 (Running time is 2 hours 20 minutes). Start time: 7.30pm

Thursday 7th September - Captain Corelli's Mandolin is the 2001 film of the book

by Louis de Bernières. An epic tale about the enduring hope of love and the devastating brutality of war, set amid the Italian occupation of Greece during World War II. It stars Nicolas Cage as a captain in the Italian army and Penelope Cruz as the gorgeous Pelagia, with John Hurt as her father, Dr Iannis. The scenery and photography are stunning (it was mainly filmed on Kefalonia). Classification: R (Running time is 2 hours 7 mins). Start time: **7.30pm**

Sunday 17th September - No Time to Die (Our long-awaited special Bond event!) - It will be a 'black-tie event (if you want to dress up), with table seating and a pay bar for wine, beer and prosecco etc. The cost is £10/ticket to include canapes. I am pleased to provide a brief report from the recent WASP BUS AGM, held at the Gomshall Club, when we were able to confirm that 2021/22 had seen a steady improvement in the WASP operation. The shopping runs continue to be appreciated by the regular passengers and there has been some revival in the runs for the local societies etc, although they are not yet back to pre-covid levels. Thanks were given to all the drivers and particularly to Rachael & Chris Dews, who look after all the bookings and maintenance etc matters, and to Alan Halder for his double role as secretary and treasurer.

We appreciate the continued support from Shere Parish Council who once again donated £1000 towards the funds that we will need eventually to replace the current bus.

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

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
